Felicia Taylor interviews Dr. Dee W. Jones on Joy in Our Town concerning rabies in Central Alabama

Host Felicia Taylor interviews Dr. Dee W. Jones with the Alabama Department of Public Health concerning Rabies in the local areas. Dr. Jones says Rabies is a deadly virus. It affects the central nervous system of mammals. It is one of the oldest known infectious diseases to mankind. It has transcended history with many myths about what it is and how to prevent and treat it. But today, through proper medical treatment and medical advancements it is 100% preventable. Rabies is endemic, meaning there are cases in wildlife such as raccoons and bats which are the predominant vectors of Rabies in this area. It is not very often seen within the city limits of Montgomery, however, it is always possible inside of an endemic area. Geographically speaking, about half of the state of Alabama from south west to north east is endemic with Rabies. Cases are expected to be seen from time to time in wildlife. He says Alabamian should

always have concerns about Rabies due to the seriousness of the virus. If proper medical attention is not given to it, it is a deadly infection. Regardless of the numbers, one should always be aware of what Rabies in an area means. Signs of Rabies in animals would include strange behavior, because of the affect the virus has on the brain, the animals will become aggressive and the virus is spread through the saliva from one animal to another animal after a bite. He says the main objective in his department is to prevent Rabies through awareness. He says if people are exposed to the saliva from a suspected animal or an animal that is acting strangely in fact any animal that they were bitten or scratched by, they should seek medical attention. The law requires that the physician seeing that person report the incident to the county health department. The health department will then investigate that case and determine the best steps to be taken based on the findings in the investigation. They work to make sure that person who has the saliva from an animal does not get Rabies. Jones says many people are concerned about what may happen to their pets if they were reported as having rabid type symptoms. He says the benefits of reporting an animal far outweighs the consequences of not reporting an animal's strange behavior. He says we are fortunate in this part of the world to have a healthcare system that investigates these cases and can prevent death through proper treatments.
