Hope Loftis talked with Corky French and Dean Barham (ministers at Community Outreach Ministries) about some of the programs they are involved in: Breathe, Outside the Lines, and Behind the Badge. Breathe is an outreach ministry which concentrates on caregivers of senior citizens. A Breathe worker helps the caregiver with the senior care or simply lets the caregiver take a break – or "breathe." Outside the Lines helps turn athletic experiences into character building experiences both on and off the field. Behind the Badge is a program designed to work with local law enforcement and their families, giving support, pastoral counsel, and guidance through Community Outreach Ministries. Teri Sloan (the Nashville Food Project) talked about feeding hungry people and families in Middle Tennessee, and how hunger is not the only problem poverty brings. The Nashville Food Project works hand in hand with other non-profits, so they can share with those in need where they can also go for help with healthy, nutritious food. They also open some of their community gardens for people to learn how to grown their own food, which they can sell at the local farmers' markets. Dr. Brooks (Addiction Campuses) spoke about the opioid addiction problem in Middle Tennessee and how opioid addiction is very strong in both Middle Tennessee and the United States. Addiction Campuses uses various forms of therapy to treat the issue of addiction, often using faith based means. They offer both online and face-to-face programs.

We also had the privilege of having Governor Mike Huckabee come to our station for some meetings. He met with several TBN staff from California, Orlando, and Tennessee, while here.



At the end of this month, we close the doors of our TMC recording studio to the public. The recording studio, as of May 1, 2017, will be used for productions, with our recording studio manager Eddy Joyner and our recording studio coordinating assistant Bonnie Hartle moving into our production department.
